# Southern Road in the News

Check out the Nursery World article about Southern Road's two-year old provision and how it has successfully helped so many children, their families and the school. Well done to everyone involved!.

### case study: Southern Road Primary School, Newham, London



'We started our provision for free-funded twoyear-olds seven years ago, after a sharp decline in numbers saw our

nursery provision for three- and four-year-olds drop from three-form entry to one-form entry,' explains Ashfiya Bobat, assistant head teacher of Southern Road Primary School.

'In an attempt to raise the profile of the school, along with numbers – and budgets – as well as supporting two-year-olds from deprived backgrounds who were falling behind in communication and personal, social and emotional skills, we lowered the age range of the school to include two-year-olds. We also raised the offer in our three- and four-year-old rooms, from 15 hours to 30 hours of funded childcare a week in an attempt to entice more working parents. We did this with the support of the London Borough of Newham's early years team.

'As a result of the changes, the school has been in a much better place over the past two years. We're at least 70 per cent full. Our Reception classes now start off with a solid 65 to 70 children and we make up the numbers for the

three-form entry throughout the year.

'The progress of the first cohort of two-year-olds, which are now in Year 2, has been phenomenal. Many of them started with extremely limited levels of language, but they have gone on to meet their expected levels of development in communication and language at the end of Key Stage 2. We are extremely proud of the confident learners they have become.

'But we had to think creatively about the process at the time. We had a great team of early years staff and this initiative helped ensure that they didn't lose their jobs.

'Fortunately, we had the physical space and only minimal changes were needed. We already had an empty nursery classroom with low-level toilets and we adapted a small room for nappy-changing facilities. There is no need for a sleeping area because the 24 two-year-olds that attend – 12 in the morning and 12 in the afternoon – only come for three-hour daily sessions, although there's a cosy area with cushions if they're tired.

'The ratio is 1:4 and we have two Level 4 nursery nurses and one teaching assistant, and I oversee the nursery – I'm a trained early years teacher. Our curriculum for two-year-olds focuses on the three prime areas of learning in the EYFS: communication and language, personal, social and emotional and physical development. It's about getting them active and using their gross motor skills and fine motors to develop the pincer grip and getting them to communicate through play.

'Movement is key. Outdoors, we have climbing frames, a sensory garden, a mud kitchen and a bike track. They have free-flow access to the outdoor garden and allocated times where they can use the play equipment and the larger areas of open space.

'With the changes to the entitlement for two-year-olds from September, we envisage even more demand, and although we don't have space for another two-year-old room, it might be that we move the children up to the three-year-old room quicker, to free up space for more two-year-olds.

'One of the biggest challenges is finding the right staff. Staff development is key, particularly with the ever-changing early years market. It's a lot of work – but it's well worth it when you see the children progress.'

Adults have a responsibility to share any concerns they have, even when they may have some doubts as to whether a child is being harmed. If you are concerned about a child, speak to someone. This might be a health visitor, teacher, family doctor, social worker or police officer. You can also contact the school and request to speak to one of the safeguarding leads who are: Ms Yearnshire, Ms Lawrence, Ms Crozier, Ms Bobat and Ms Henna.




## **Book Review**

If you have children, it is understandable to have concerns about the films and TV to have concerns about the films and TV shows they watch, as well as the games they play. In this guide, we take a look at the two official ways you can assess if a particular title is suitable for your child. Both the BBFC and PEGI have search facilities on their websites that can be used to look up individual titles so you can check their ratings.





#### RATINGS FOR FILMS, TV & MUSIC VIDEOS

Since 1912, the BBFC (British Board of Film Classification) has music videos - providing parents with the informed UK residents of the age suitability of films, TV and music videos - providing parents with the information needed to assess whether or not it is appropriate for their child's age. This applies to cinema releases, DVDs and streaming video services such as Netflix.

#### WHAT ARE THE BBFC RATINGS?

BBFC ratings are broken down into seven age categories:

Universal, suitable for all ages Parental Guidance











Adult content only available in specially licenced cinemas and specialist retailers

#### WHAT ELSE CAN BBFC REVEAL?

Accompanied with the age suitability rating, BBFC also provide an additional warning regarding the content and what to expect, such as swearing, sexual content, violence and anything you may consider to be inappropriate for your child. In addition to this, the content is also rated in three levels: frequent, mild or strong.

#### LIMITATIONS OF BBFC RATINGS

It's important to note that there is no obligation on streaming video services to use or display BBFC ratings. Due to this, we advise that you check the rating online before your child streams the content. It may also be a good idea to watch the content first yourself or discuss it with other parents to help you decide whether or not it is suitable for your child.

#### RATINGS FOR GAMES

PEGI (Pan European Game Information) is a content rating system that ensures all video games are labelled with a minimum age recommendation. These age recommendations are based on the types of content featured within a game. With each game, PEGI also provide a content descriptor that indicates the potential issues and concerns, including sex, violence, bad language and drugs.

#### WHAT ARE THE PEGI RATINGS?

PEGI ratings are split into age restriction and content descriptors. Additional 'content descriptors' help parents and children to understand the type of content featured within a particular game, including sex, fear, bad language, discrimination, gambling, drugs, violence, and in-game purchases. In combination, the two different ratings can provide a good level of information to help make informed decisions regarding the suitability for your child.

















#### LIMITATIONS OF PEGI RATINGS

It's possible for young people to buy games online without a required proof of age, opening them up to age-inappropriate content without you knowing. We advise that you regularly monitor your child's gaming activities and maintain a honest and healthy dialogue with them about the online world.

#### PARENTAL CONTROLS

It is a good idea to put in place parental controls for all online accounts which your child may use to purchase or download online games e.g. The App Store, Google Play Store, PlayStation Store and Microsoft Xbox Store etc.


