














What Ofsted said about us ...

Thank you to all the staff, the children and the Southern Road community for your support over the years which has resulted in such a glowing report.

Pupils enjoy coming to this friendly, happy and welcoming school. Staff know the pupils well and care for them. Pupils are kind and caring to each other.

The school has high expectations for all pupils, including those with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND). Pupils relish their learning and work hard.

Reading takes priority here. Staff read to pupils daily. Pupils read widely and often. They talk with enthusiasm about the books they are reading. This includes children in the early years.

The school is calm and orderly. There is very little low-level disruption in lessons. Leaders work hard to develop pupils' sense of individual responsibility.

The school provides a broad and interesting curriculum, which matches the ambition of the national curriculum.

Leaders and teachers know their pupils very well, and they are quick to identify any additional needs. Teachers make adjustments in class to help pupils to access subject content successfully. Pupils with the most complex needs receive extra support to help them develop important life and learning skills.

Pupils talked excitedly about the wide range of after-school clubs, outings and visits at the school. The school has created an open and positive culture around safeguarding that puts pupils' interests first.

What to do if you are concerned about a child?

Adults have a responsibility to share any concerns they have, even when they may have some doubts as to whether a child is being harmed. If you are concerned about a child, speak to someone. This might be a health visitor, teacher, family doctor, social worker or police officer. You can also contact the school and request to speak to one of the safeguarding leads who are: Ms Yearnshire, Ms Lawrence, Ms Crozier, Ms Bobat and Ms Henna.



Headlice

Please can you check your children regularly for headlice.

Head lices are tiny wingless insects. They live among human hairs and feed on blood from the scalp. Head lice are a common problem, especially for kids. They spread easily from person to person, and sometimes are tough to get rid of. Their bites can make a child's scalp itchy and irritated, and scratching can lead to infection.

Head lice are annoying, but they're not dangerous and they don't spread disease. They're not a sign of poor hygiene — head lice need blood and they don't care whether it's from someone who's clean or dirty. It's best to treat head lice right away to prevent them from spreading.

Please ensure that all articles of clothing are clearly labelled with the child's name especially school sweatshirts and coats as it does make returning lost property much easier.



Nursery - Read With Me



KEEP YOUR PERSONAL

INFORMATION PRIVATE ONLINE Only share it with people you know like friends and family. Ask a trusted adult, like your teacher or a family member, to help you change your privacy settings so that strangers can't see it.

SPEAK POLITELY AND BE KIND TO OTHERS WHEN YOU SPEAK TO THEM ONLINE

Treat them like you would treat them in real life and always remember your manners.

ARE BEING BULLIED ONLINE

If other another person is sending you nasty messages, a trusted adult will be able to help you collect evidence and report the person to the relevant authorities.

USE PASSWORDS TO PROTECT YOUR PERSONAL INFORMATION

Ask a trusted adult to help you create a password that you can easily remember but which is hard for other people to guess.

ALWAYS CHECK WITH A TRUSTED ADULT FIRST BEFORE USING A DEVICE OR DOWNLOADING A NEW APP

This is so that they can check it is safe for you to use and make sure the privacy settings are right.

TELL A TRUSTED ADULT IF YOU SEE SOMETHING ONLINE WHICH YOU DON'T LIKE

This can include anything that upsets you, makes you feel sad or which you're unsure about.

USE THE INTERNET TO HAVE FUN AND TO HELP YOU FIND OUT INFORMATION ABOUT THINGS

Remember to ask your trusted adult for help and always use child friendly search engines so that the information you get back is safe.

ACCEPT FRIEND REQUESTS FROM STRANGERS OR PEOPLE YOU DON'T KNOW


Always tell a trusted adult if somebody you don't know tries to contact you online.

REPLY TO MESSAGES FROM ONLINE BULLIES OR PEOPLE WHO SEND YOU NASTY MESSAGES
